Notes from AHAC board co-chair

In our June board meeting we changed our bylaws and our mission statement. We made these changes to clarify who is welcome in AHAC. Since AHAC is an *action* committee, we wanted to make sure that everyone on the committee was included and had something they could do.

With these changes our mission statement now says: "The Anti-Hunger Action Committee is a membership organization for food pantry clients, advocates and volunteers that organizes low-income people to take action on poverty issues, educates

low-income people about available resources and provides opportunities to become more involved in the community."

[Our bylaws used to require members to volunteer with AHAC one hour a month. Now we are more specific about the kind of help we need. If AHAC members could commit to handing out at least three copies of our newsletter each month, we can help more people learn about our exciting and passionate advocacy efforts! Of course, if a member would prefer to volunteer an hour in a dif-

ferent capacity, that would count as their monthly membership duty.]

Our bylaws now say in Article II: "To become a member of the Anti-Hunger Action Committee a person must sign an annual pledge card committing to hand out three copies of the newsletter each month and/or volunteer at least one hour each month for the Anti-Hunger Action Committee or a food pantry."

AHAC brings social change to churches, community

The Anti-Hunger Action Committee has been a leader in advocating for justice for those in Utah who live in poverty. AHAC is the fortunate recipient of a grant through the SDOP (Self Development of People) which provided, among other things, electronic equipment for us to use in our community-wide anti-poverty presentations.

I am proud to be a part of AHAC, and one of my favorite ways to volunteer is to assist Sarah Martindell

and Linda Hilton of Crossroads Urban Center and CORC (the Coalition of Religious Communities) in the presentation of information about poverty in Utah and related issues to various church fellowship hours and groups.

A recent focus of the coffee-hour talks has been healthcare. I inform the participants about U.S. Senator Max Baucus's (D-Mont.) Call to Action Health Reform 2009 plan which would extend eligibility criteria for

Medicaid. Participants at the AHAC/CORC talks are very concerned about how they can help others and ask many excellent and insightful questions, clearly wanting to fight poverty and injustice in their own ways. I appreciate the guests' level of activity and how interested everyone is in the topic. It is truly a pleasure and honor to be able to present this information and help be a catalyst for positive change, a role that CORC and AHAC both fill.
